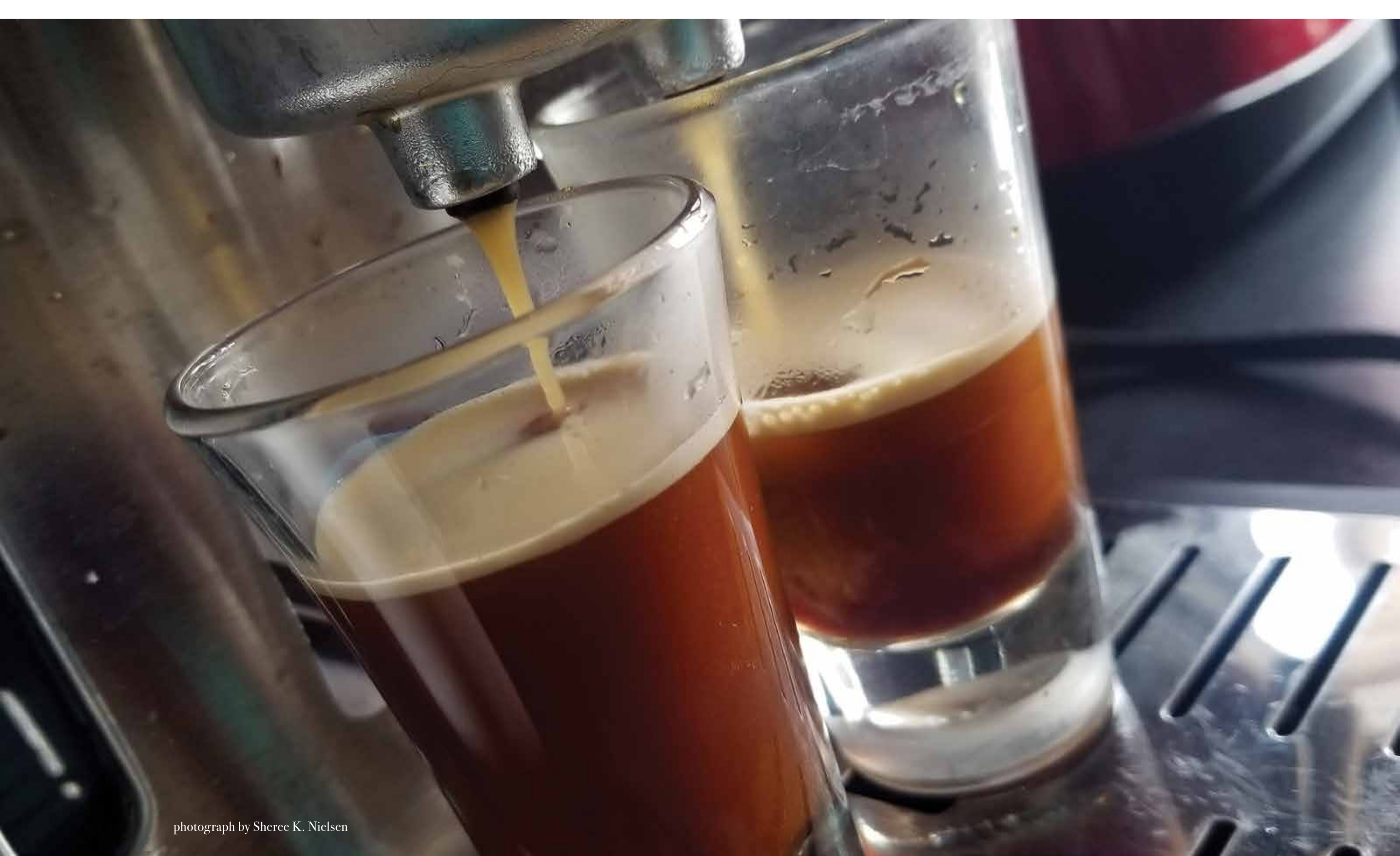

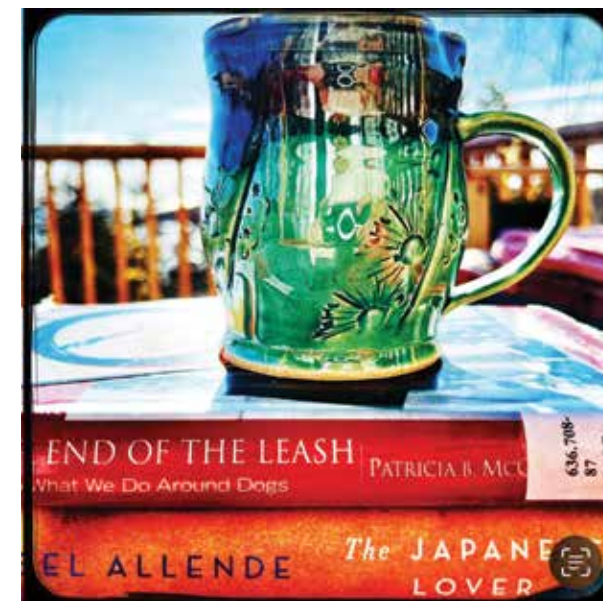


“The rituals of morning coffee and afternoon tea link the stages of my day and of my life. But just as important as the beverage are the memories each cupful conjures.
